Discover, Connect and Take Action are the 3 Keys to leadership. There are five expected short / medium term outcomes for each key. Each outcome is further explained by how it relates to girls at each program age level. A glance at the outcomes shows you what Girl Scouting is really all about. You can see some of these outcomes referenced throughout this book—each program listing indicates which outcome(s) it will focus on to meet the mission of Girl Scouts.

3 Keys to Leadership

DISCOVER: Understand themselves and their values and use their knowledge and skills to explore the world.

3 Core Processes

Girl Led: Girl led is just what it sounds like—girls play an active part in figuring out the what, where, when, how and why of their activities. They lead the planning and decision making as much as possible. This ensures that girls are engaged in their learning and experience leadership opportunities as they prepare to become active participants in their local and global communities.

Learning By Doing: A hands—on learning process that engages girls in continuous cycles of action and reflection that result in deeper understanding of concepts and mastery of practical skills. As they participate in meaningful activities and then reflect on them, girls get to explore their own questions, discover answers, gain new skills, and share ideas and observations with others. Throughout the process, it's important for girls to be able to connect their experiences to their lives and apply what they have learned to their future experiences.

Cooperative Learning: Through cooperative learning, girls work together toward shared goals in an atmosphere of respect and collaboration that encourages the sharing of skills, knowledge, and learning. Working together in all—girl environments also encourages girls to feel powerful and emotionally and physically safe, and it allows them to experience a sense of belonging even in the most diverse groups.

ROQs Reflective Outcome Questions

This fall at council sponsored activities look for ROQs. No, not rocks, like you find on the ground, but ROQs—Reflective Outcome Questions!

The ROQs are questions designed to lead discussions about the event that just happened linking the activities the girls just participated in to the Girl Scout Leadership Experience and the 15 national outcomes in a timely, relevant and tangible way.

It's additional program support for after the event to help Girl Scouts and their parents recognize how the Girl Scout program builds girls of courage, confidence and character who make the world a better place.

The revised Program Aide Training is here! Under the new format, Program Aides will become fully trained and earn the PA Pin by attending one Council sponsored PA Training Weekend as well as begin to accumulate hours towards the 25 needed for the Program Aide patch. Ideally, to earn the PA patch, PAs will use the leadership skills they've learned in PA training with younger Girl Scouts. PAs can volunteer their leadership within a troop, their Service Unit, or by volunteering at a Council sponsored event. PA Training Weekend

This weekend is designed to give potential Program Aides the ultimate PA training experience and earn their PA pin! Girls will spend 10 hours focusing on various aspects of leadership by participating in hands-on activities, learning necessary skills, and reflecting in their new PA Leadership Journal. Saturday night, girls will plan an event for Girl Scout Daisies or Brownies. On Sunday, PAs will use their newly acquired leadership skills and their event planning expertise to host Daisy Fun Day or Brownie Play Day. Please bring personal camping items for the weekend such as a sleeping bag and pillow, clothes, toiletries and a water bottle.

Previously, to become a trained Program Aide, girls had to register to attend Core Training and two specialty trainings to complete the PA pin. Program Aides who have already taken Core Training, but have not finished their specialty trainings should plan to complete these trainings this fall. Beginning January 2010, specialty PA trainings will no longer be offered. Program Aides who are currently fully trained need not be re-trained. Pre-Requisite: Core Training.

PA Outdoor Skills Speciality Training

There are eight basic outdoor skills, come learn more about them and practice how to share these skills with younger Girl Scouts. Learn how to build a one-match fire and learn how to tie the knot that will pitch a tent! Be dressed for the weather in appropriate camp attire, as this training takes place outdoors. Please bring a sack lunch if you are also attending PA Flag Ceremonies on the same day.

PA Flag Ceremonies Speciality Training

Many Girl Scout meetings, ceremonies, and events begin with a flag ceremony and may even end with one too! Brush up on the basics of flag ceremonies by learning proper flag courtesies, planning an opening and closing ceremony and participating in a flag retirement. Be dressed appropriately for the weather as this training will take place outdoors.

PA Songs & Games Speciality Training

Every good PA has a few good songs and games to share! Learn how to keep younger Girl Scouts engaged, having fun, and learning new skills. Practice leading a song and teaching a game while learning some new ones yourself!

PA National Science Partnership Speciality Training

Explore the wonders of simple science by participating in hands-on experiments. Practice science activities while learning the best ways to teach younger girls how to discover and inquire into the magic of science.

Choose an event to attend. Select and fully complete the appropriate registration form. Submit the registration form(s) to GSGC with full payment.

On line: Go to www.girlscouts-gateway.org to register for an event. Credit cards only please. All on-line registrations receive an e-mail acknowledgement that the registration was received; however you still may be placed on a waiting list. Please look for a second e-mail confirming registration or indicating that you are on a waiting list for the specific event. If you do not receive the acknowledgement e-mail, your registration may not have been received in our office. Please contact the Activities Registrar immediately to confirm your registration.

Registration Periods

Each program has an opening day of registration as well as a closing day of registration. This is the window during which registrations for the program will be processed. This DOES NOT mean that registrations cannot be sent into the office early. All early registration payments will be processed, but the actual registration form will be held until the opening date of registration. If a program has more registrations than spaces before the opening date of registration, a lottery will be done to choose the participants; additional participants will be placed on a waiting list. After the opening date, all registrations will be processed as they are received. Only completed registration forms with the required payments will be considered.

Late Registration

Programs that do not meet minimum registration by the close of the regular registration period may be cancelled without going into the late registration period. The late registration period enables programs between the minimum and maximum

number of participants to continue to accept registrations to better serve our membership. Late registrations, registrations received after the last day of registration, will require a late fee in addition to the regular event fee; see each event to determine the late fee and late registration dates.

Troop Registration

All troops registering for events—including two (2) or more girls from the same troop—must bring adult chaperones per Safety Wise ratios to the event. Events that require the use of the troop registration form depend on additional adult supervision of the troop for a quality program.

Individual with Adult Chaperone Registration

These events are open to ZIP Girl Scouts and girls involved in a troop who wish to participate in an event that the troop is not going to as a whole. These events require that girls MUST bring an adult chaperone with them to the event; the event is staffed for the program, but not general supervision of individual girls.

Individual Registration

A limited number of programs are offered for individual girls with no adult chaperones required; staff at the event is sufficient to supervise girls and provide the program.

Registration Confirmation

All participants registering for an event will be notified of their status. Only those who have registered will be notified of change or cancellation by phone, e-mail or postal service. Most programs DO NOT have a separate confirmation packet, please read the program descriptors for specific items to bring. All participants must bring a permission slip and health form to all events. If a separate confirmation packet is provided, it will be noted in the program descriptors.

Payment

Payments must accompany the registration form, unless otherwise stated. Payments are accepted by cash, check, money order, Visa or Mastercard. Any registration payments received prior to the opening date of registration for a specific program will be processed; if the participants are wait-listed for the event, refunds will not be issued until after the event is over. If a participant chooses not to be placed on the waiting list, a refund will be issued.

Cookie dough can be applied to girl registration fees only (not adult fees) for council sponsored program events.

If an event has an exceptionally high cost, please contact Lori Richards to discuss payment plan options at 904–388–4653 or I-800-347-2688.

Financial Grant Applications

Scholarships are available to registered Girl Scouts, who, for whatever reason, find it difficult to pay for the costs associated with membership and/or events. Completed grant applications should

accompany the registration form along with 50% of the program fee for each person requesting a financial grant. Applications and information are available from any Service Center, Troop Leader, Service Unit Manager or Membership Specialist.

Cancellation and No Shows

Participants who do not show up for an event will forfeit the registration fee.

Please contact the Jacksonville Service Center if unable to attend an event. Cancellations are accepted in writing to the Activities Registrar until the last day of the regular registration period (not late registration). Any cancellations made after the registration date are NON-REFUNDABLE due to the expenses incurred.

Insufficient registration may result in the cancellation of an event; all registrants will be notified of the cancellation and fees will be fully refunded. All cancellations and refunds will be processed at the Jacksonville Service Center.




